

What will you do when they fail in a disaster or emergency? As difficult as this is to comprehend in our connected world, your cell phone and internet may be unavailable for some time.





FRS (Family Radio Service) GMRS (General Mobile Radio Service) AMATEUR ("HAM") RADIO

- You may already have FRS radio(s)
- No license required
- Operate on UHF frequencies
- Offer ~14 channels
- Require clear line of sight for best performance
- FCC license required (no test)
- \$35 for 10 years (covers family)
- Limited range—best for small areas Higher power, better antennas, and more channels than FRS
 - GMRS repeaters may extend range in some areas
 - · Limited distance; best with line of sight
 - Ideal for neighborhood use only



- FCC license required (valid for 10 years)
- Enables voice and email (via Winlink) communication
- · Connects with Emergency Management and areas outside disaster zone
- · Without a license, you can still listen to ham radio updates during emergencies
